Epiphany 2023

The Season of Epiphany begins with the arrival of the Magi from afar to visit and pay homage to the infant Jesus in Bethlehem - the event through which God makes known that Jesus is the Light for the world. "Epiphany" comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning 'manifestation' or 'appearance'. It is, in some sense, a continuation of the Christmas season.

This season is the season of light. It is the time when we recall the Gospel story of Christ as the Light of the World to all peoples. It is a time in which we focus on the Transfiguration and glory of Christ, the mission of the Church to reach all the peoples of the earth, and the great gift of God's grace in revealing healing truth and light to the world.

The season begins with Christmas on December 25, the birth of Christ, followed by the 12 Days of Christmas which lead to the feast of Epiphany on January 6. The season of the Epiphany continues until the day before Ash Wednesday, which this year, is February 16.

The Baptism of our Lord is observed on the Sunday after Epiphany. The gospels for the other Sundays of the Epiphany season describe the wedding at Cana, the calling of the disciples, and various miracles and teachings of Jesus. The Last Sunday after the Epiphany is always devoted to the Transfiguration. Jesus' identity as the Son of God is dramatically revealed in the Transfiguration gospel, as well as the gospel of the baptism of Christ. We are called to respond to Christ in faith through the showings of his divinity recorded in the gospels of the Epiphany season.

During the Season of Epiphany, we also remember the revelation of Christ to John the Baptist, to the disciples, and to all Christians. We also remember Christ's baptism and our own, together with the ways in which Christ has been revealed to humankind, especially in the healing miracles.

The liturgical color of the season is green, representing the green things of God's earth and referring to growth of the Spirit of God within us in response to His coming at Christmas.

Parish News

The future of St. Matthew's and many of the churches in the Diocese of Newark is currently at risk. Declining attendance and pledging has made it difficult for many of the churches to survive. There are 96 congregations in the diocese and 30 of them do not have full time clergy. Finding part time clergy has become a difficult task and as you are aware, some weeks we worship with Annunciation in Oradell or St. Martin's in



Maywood. The Bishop has said that churches are not to continue using supply priests every week, and that a Eucharist celebration is really only required for one Sunday per month.

St. Matthew's offered a presentation to the parish on September 25, 2022 to discuss this issue and to find direction for us to proceed. Owen Davitt, our Minister of Music prepared a video presentation pinpointing areas where help is needed from the congregation to continue worship and other services provided by St. Matthew's Church. Members were asked to volunteer to take on some of the tasks that are required to keep running so that the full burden no longer falls on George Hahn, to whom we offer our deepest gratitude. Some members have come forward to help. Pat Johnson is the newest member of the Altar Guild, and Shawn Herrick comes weekly to clean inside the church. What can you do to contribute?

Following the meeting, a survey created by Owen was sent by email to all members of our church community to determine which areas they felt are most important, how they could help continue our church life and what direction we wish to pursue. Some of the surveys were received but better data can be collected if more members could complete and return their surveys. The survey is anonymous, and our input is critical to define how our journey forward will look. Submit one for each member of your family for the best results.

Bishop's Study Group

Bishop Carlye Hughes has started discussion groups to address these issues of direction for the churches in the Diocese of Newark. The title for our sessions is "Moving Forward with Jesus: The Gospel, the Kingdom and Getting Unstuck". The situation we face in 2023 is both unprecedented and at the same time similar to what the church has faced time and again since the very beginning—the need to get unstuck and restart in what seems a whole new world. The end of this work is not to find a strategy to restore things to what they were, or even to fix things—it is to look together at how we can join in the new thing that God is doing.

Welcome Father Joe Leigh!

St. Matthew's welcomed Father Joe Leigh as our newest visiting priest during late November. He travels to St. Matthew's from Keansburg, New Jersey, and provides wonderful sermons. He is filled with information from his years of experience and is happy to answer our questions. Here is a brief bio that he provided to us:

The Rev. Father W. Joseph Leigh was born in Denver, Colorado and spent the first 25+ years as an active member of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, located 2 blocks south of the State Capital. His parish family there sent him off to Seabury-Western Seminary then in Evanston, IL. After his ordination to the Diaconate, he served a year at St. Philip's, Joplin, MO, where he was ordained to the priesthood. In 1979 he returned for a short time to Colorado serving two small parishes off I-70 in Eastern Colo. Father Joe was called by the Rector of Saint Uriel the Archangel in Sea Girt in September 1980 as Curate. He served as Assistant at Grace, Merchantville (1983-84), Rector of St. James, Eatontown (1985-90), Interim of All Saint's, Lakewood (1990-91), Vicar of both St. Mary the Virgin, Keyport, and St. Clement's, Belford (1991-2000). He returned to St. Uriel's from 2000 to 2004 as an Associate. Father Joe then returned to the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Keyport in be 2005 and retired following the closure of St. Mary's on Advent 2, December 2019. Father Joe has remained active serving as a Supply Priest since then.

Newest Acolyte

Father Joe is also helpful to the acolytes who are learning to serve at the Eucharist celebrations. We have a new acolyte, Zach Sternbach, younger brother of Hunter Sternbach, shown here with their Mom, Jennifer. Jen and her sister Katie were both acolytes at St. Matthew's and were confirmed here while growing up in our congregation.

Words of Peace

"It will still light; it will still serve its' purpose," he stated. Immediately, I began to argue back.... "But it's broken and ugly and glass is everywhere. It's just not the same."

I walked away and when I came back, he had placed the candle on the counter and lit the wick. My heart immediately was drawn to the light. How often do we do this in our own lives or with others? Things don't turn out the way we want them to. Plans fail. Dreams shatter.
